- Everything comes from God. Everyone is the recipient of God's generosity. We are all gifted.
- It doesn't matter what our gifts are or how many we have received. What matters is how we use our gifts.
- Whatever we think we have and whoever we are, it is our responsibility to discover what gifts we have, to recognize them and use them in a manner that shows gratitude to God in order to follow Christ using the road map of stewardship.
- What Jesus knew that we have forgotten or not yet learned is that all of creation – the entire spiritual and material universe – has been entrusted to us, not simply given to us.
- To embrace stewardship as a way of life, as Jesus did, means truly letting go of our dependence on the things of this world
- Giving is an expression of discipleship, one of the fundamental principles affirmed in all stewardship efforts.
- We were made in the image and likeness of God. This does not mean that we all look like God physically. What it means is that we share in God's nature and God's nature is love, and sharing and giving.
- When we give without any expectation of return we get a great feeling of satisfaction and even joy because when we do this we are fulfilling our nature.
- We are charged with being good managers of all these things.
- The practice of stewardship is rooted in our baptism. To live our baptism is to live a life as a Christian Steward
- It takes a change in my priorities... a conversion experience. Not just a change in attitude but a change of heart... an acceptance of a personal invitation to follow Jesus without counting the cost.

The Diocese of Wichita, Ks, recognized as the founders of teaching Stewardship As A Way of Life has written a manual which identifies important building blocks within, under and around "pillars" stewardship.

Today we will address Prayer as the second pillar.

- 1. **Pastor:** a man of prayer, who helps lead his parishioners to be a people of prayer. Spiritual exercises promote private daily prayer, communal prayer and participation in the sacramental life of the church. Through his leadership, prayer is the rock foundation of every parish direction and decision.
- 2. **Pastoral Planning**: prayer needs to precede the development of the parish pastoral plan, as well as, precede every step of the implementation of the plan. Parish organizations can model this by beginning meetings, activities with prayer.
- 3. *Holiness:* is the perfection of love—to be like Jesus. The gift and call to holiness is first given to us at our Baptism when we become children of God. Our journey of faith in this life is a spiritual journey to the Lord.
- 4. **Sacraments:** frequent reception of the Sacraments, especially Reconciliation and Holy Communion, strengthen us in our journey to holiness.
- 5. **Liturgy:** celebration of the Sunday Mass is the source and summit of our lives as faithful stewards. The Eucharist not only feeds us, but challenges us to share the gifts we have received with others.
- 6. Gratitude: a deep sense of gratitude <sup>P</sup>ills the heart of a steward. A steward understand that everything they are and have that is good comes from God. Our desire to thank God is His gift from us.
- 7. Conversion: Our journey towards holiness requires a lifetime of daily conversion. Prayer helps us to see ourselves as God sees us and to see who God calls us to become.
- **8. Virtus:** through faithful lives of prayer, we grow in virtue (a habitual and firm decision to do good). A steward is a person of virtue.
